1.0 Call to Order – Carolyn Johnson, Chair

- Welcome: Chair, Carolyn Johnson called to order the Contra Costa County Local Planning Council for Child Care and Development Board meeting at 5:37 p.m.
- Introductions
- Meeting Protocol: Chair Johnson stated that the meeting adheres to the Brown Act. If a member of the public wishes to speak on a matter on the agenda please give your name and identify any group or organization you represent for the record prior to your presentation. If you wish to speak on a matter not on the agenda, please wait until the Chair calls for public comment at the end of the regular meeting. The Council shall only take action related to items listed on the current agenda.
- Agenda review and adoption: Kathy Laferty made the motion to approve agenda. Deborah Penry seconds the motion. Motion carried.
- Consider Approval of Past Minutes: Margaret Wiegert Jacobs made a motion to accept the minutes of the LPC board meeting dated on 09/23/10. Sue Houweling seconds the motion. Deborah Penry and Danielle Storey abstain. Motion carried.

2.0 Planning Council Correspondence:

- Information included for the council
 - Application for LPC Membership from Janeen Rockwell-Owens
 - Sponsorship Letter from Kids' Club Preschool

3.0 Council Action Items:

- Parent Education Campaign Proposal - Ruth Fernandez presented a report on the Parent Education Campaign. She provided an overview with background information about this initiative and its connection to the LPC's Comprehensive County-wide Plan. Additionally, she described in detail the recommendations for

dissemination of the Road Map to Kindergarten. A final copy of the tool was presented tonight. The Road Map was printed in both English and Spanish. Thanked the members that were on the “Road Map” committee. Ruth presented four recommendations for the planning and implementation of the Parent Education Campaign using the Road Map as the centerpiece. Cathy Roof made a motion to approve all four recommendations as stated in the staff report. Kathy Lafferty seconds the motion. Motion carried. [Recommendation language was included in the board packet]

Discussion begins:

Margaret: I think it is wonderful. I see providers using the Road Map and being trained on how to use it with their families.

Danielle: I want to make sure that the Road Map is available in my area and would be willing to pay the assigned fee.

Diana: This is the first time I see a publication like the Road Map. I think it is great. I have been working on planning a fair and I hope to implement it next Spring. The fair will take place in West County first. I received a request from one of the parents who wants to participate in the fair for more information for parents that would be like a Road Map of what they need to do for children to be ready for school. I know that the need is out there and the Road Map to Kindergarten would be the perfect tool.

Ron: A particular dissemination group would be the staff at the First 5 Resource Centers. Would it be legal to reproduce for providers who would like to recreate it?

Ruth: It is not reproducible, and it is available in English and Spanish. A minimal fee would be charged. The cost has not been determined yet, but would be cost recovery for printing, shipping and handling.

Margaret: I like the idea of teaching people how to use the Road Map.

Cathy: Other counties may be interested in accessing the tool.

Ruth: Other counties have requested a copy. It is not copyrighted, but it is an LPC product. We could put a sticker on it declaring that it is not reproducible and also add a disclaimer on our website.

- Healthy Food and Beverage Environment Policy
Ruth Fernandez presented a policy recommendation to adopt a healthy food and beverage environment policy. This recommendation is a follow-up strategy identified in the LPC’s Comprehensive County-wide Plan as it relates to Kaiser

Permanente's Healthy and Active before 5 Initiative. The recommendation was approved by the LPC's Executive Committee with one amendment. The requested amendment was to restate bullet 2 under the recommendation as follows: Require that contractors/grantees follow the LPC's Healthy Food and Beverage Policies at LPC sponsored events and trainings. Margaret Weigert-Jacobs made a motion to adopt a Healthy Food and Beverage Environment Policy. Sue Houweling seconds the motion. Motion carried. [Recommendation language was included in the board packet]

Discussion begins.

Joan: I think it is best to define Healthy, for example, zero soda and zero juice. If we are really going to follow the guidelines of being healthy and active before five, people need to understand what that actually means. Need to know what this means for adults as well.

Kathy: I would not be specific in this particular proposal, but I would add a separate list.

Ruth: This is a recommendation that we implement a policy, but I would have to come back to the Council to adopt a specific language for the policy that will be shared with the public.

Joan: I read this differently.

Danielle: This is not a specific policy.

Ruth: Clarifying that this is a recommendation to adopt a policy. Once this recommendation is approved then I would come back to the Council with the policy language for approval.

Debbie: Actually First5 is working on this as well. My understanding is that it is not that you provide these items exclusively, but that you provide ample options for those who would like a healthy alternative during meetings. We are expanding a list of guidelines that you may like to look at. Rea is working on this.

Ruth: I will check in with Rea.

- LPC Self-Evaluation Findings and Annual Report
Ruth reported that the Executive Committee met to review and discuss the self-evaluation and compliance items. The Executive Committee found that the LPC is in compliance. Comments will be included in reference to the continuous member recruitment to fill current vacancies. Ruth also reported that there are multiple potential members in line. She continues to follow-up with interested

individuals. Copies of the self-evaluation findings and annual report will be given to the County Superintendent of Schools and the Family and Human Services Committee of the Board of Supervisors. Margaret Weigert-Jacobs made a motion to accept the LPC Self-Evaluation Findings and Annual Report. Cathy Roof seconds the motion. Motion carried. [Report forms were included in the board packet]

- LPC Member Appointment Recommendation for Janeen Rockwell-Owens Ruth read the recommendation from the Executive Committee to refer Janeen Rockwell-Owens for LPC membership appointment to the County Superintendent of Schools and the Family and Human Services Committee of the Board of Supervisors. Referral is being made for Community 5 Seat Category East County Region, based on applicant's role as Vice-President of the East County Providers' Network. Margaret Weigert-Jacobs made a motion to accept LPC Member Appointment Recommendation for Janeen Rockwell-Owens. Sue Houweling seconds the motion. Motion carried. [Recommendation memorandum was included in the board packet]

4.0 **Preschool Makes a Difference Program Presentation** - Dr. Debi Silverman

- Dr. Debi Silverman from First Five Contra Costa presented on the Preschool Makes a Difference Program (PMD Program). She presented details about program goals, participation criteria, and county areas of implementation. Dr. Silverman expanded on the impact the PMD program is having on quality enhancement for participating providers. Handouts were shared with the audience.

Questions from the audience:

Danielle: Is there any possibility that this program will reach out to the far East County?

Debi: Not at this time, funding is limited. The only possibility is if this county is able to access ELQIS funding.

Danielle: Although far East County is not considered a high need area, there is great need out there.

Debi: There is so much need. We continue to look for additional funding in order to expand.

Ruth: It will be interesting to see the differences across the county regarding need and supply of child care once the needs assessment is conducted. The LPC is waiting for the new census data to start collecting data for the now over due county-wide needs assessment.

Silvana: One thing I do not see included in the program is parent participation. When participation is mandatory parent involvement improves. But the State does not allow it to be mandatory.

Debi: First we must ensure that providers have the right information and are able to communicate with parents. Right now we are working on relationships and next concepts.

Deborah: Regional Center's Prevention Program, would kids in this program be eligible?

Debi: Any children in the county who are in the Centralized Eligibility List (CEL) then qualify.

Sue: How are they pulled off the list?

Debi: Child Care Council is funded to place children on the CEL. It is definitely a parent choice program. Honor family's choice.

5.0 Early Childhood Programs and Services Presentation- Ellen Blinderman

- Ellen Blinderman from Lawrence Hall of Science (LHS) -UC Berkeley presented on why science is important in early childhood. Additionally, she shared resources and information from LHS that are available for the community.

6.0 Coordinator's Report – Ruth Fernandez

- Community Challenge Grant Collaboration (CCG): Ruth included a fact sheet on the maternal child and adolescent health community challenge grant. The primary goal of the Community Challenge Grant is to prevent teenage pregnancy and unwanted pregnancy. The Contra Costa Local Planning Council will be included as a collaborative partner in the application for new CCG funds. Handout provided for additional information. Brenda Sharp, Supervisor of Student Programs, is the lead for this grant and will present at the January LPC meeting.
- Family and Human Services Reports: Ruth informed the Council that she is scheduled to appear at the Family and Human Services Committee meeting on Monday, December 6, 2010 at 1:00 p.m. at 651 Pine St., Martinez. She will be providing a report on LPC activities, these reports are conducted twice a year. [LPC Annual Activities Report was included in the board packet]
- CARES Plus RFA: Ruth reported that the First5 California Commission released a request for application for CARES Plus. The Contra Costa First5 staff has expressed interests in submitting an application. Local commissions have first

right of refusal. LPC's are required partners in the application. First5 Commission is convening a cross agency meeting to discuss opportunities for collaboration and the design of the application.

Dr. Debi Silverman handed out an overview document of the CARES Plus application. She mentioned that a proposal will be presented to the First5 Commission at the next commission meeting.

7.0 Committee Reports

Executive Committee-Carolyn Johnson

We were really concerned with having a 50% reduction in the LPC funding allocation. We reviewed samples of support letters from other counties regarding the LPC funding. The decision was made that we draft a support letter that will be given through a face to face meeting to both LPC appointing bodies. The letter would be asking for their support and to advocate at the State level to restore LPC funding. Ruth will compose a one page local impact and a template for you to send to legislators.

Advocacy Committee-Cathy Roof

Young Children's Issues Forum 2011- Cathy Roof : A site has been determined, the event will be held at Los Medanos College. Ruth is working on confirming the date; the soft date at this time is March 19th. The committee is looking for a motivational keynote speaker. Please send any ideas to the committee.

This money would be utilized to pilot a quality rating and improvement system in California. At the last ELAC meeting future meeting dates were approved, they are posted on the CDE website. The next meeting is scheduled for February 17, 2010. Ruth will send out a reminder for the meeting to the Council members.

The Contra Costa Local Planning Council for Child Care and Development is excited to support the Contra Costa County Office of Education's application for the WIA Youth Program Services. Many members of the Local Planning Council share a vision with the Youth Development Services program of an educated, thriving workforce. Also, organizations such as Head Start are committed to recruiting staff from neighborhoods where services to clients are provided. These are often the same neighborhoods where many youth and young adults reside who are eligible for WIA program services.

At the last Executive Committee meeting the LPC discussed with the Youth Development Services Manager opportunities to strengthen the connection between secondary and post-secondary education for all students interested in a career in Early Childhood Education, but particularly for students with multiple barriers to achieving success in academic and career pursuits. Our initial conversations centered on professional learning communities for youth who have abilities and interest in pursuing a career in education. The cohort groups would form in secondary school and continue at community colleges where Early Childhood Educators would mentor the developing youth educators.

This plan to strengthen the pool of eligible Early Childhood Educators is very much in a developmental stage. However, many of the members of LPC have sponsored youth workers from the WIA programs and we are anxious to continue our support of Youth Development Services and the fine work they do preparing young people for meaningful careers.

WHY ALL THE FUSS?

- 70% of teen mothers drop out of high school, making pregnancy the primary reason young women drop out early. Only 30% of teen mothers complete high school by age 30, compared to 76% of women who delay parenthood until age 21 or older. (Berglas, N., Brindis, C., and Cohen, J., p. 24)
- Although teen mothers who stay in school are just as likely to graduate as non-mothers, those who drop out before or shortly after childbirth are only half as likely to return to school and graduate as are non-mother dropouts. (Constantine, N., and Nevarez, C., p.2)

MORE DATA

- Fathers to children of teen mothers, whether teenaged or older themselves, tend to start with low educational attainment and low incomes, and to live in low-income communities.
- Fathers of children born to teens are on average almost four years older than the mothers, and a majority is over the age of 21. (Public Policy Institute of California, p. 5)

FATHER'S IN THE MIRROR

- Only one out of five teen mothers receive any financial support from their child's father. (Berglas, N., Brindis, C., and Cohen, J., pp. 25-26)
- In 1997, one of every four children born to a teen mother had a father who met one of three criminal categories for statutory rape. (Public Policy Institute of California, p. 5)

Why Should you be involved? For the Safety Of Our Young Children!

Children born to mothers age 15 and younger are two times more likely to become an indicated case of child abuse/neglect in the first five years of their lives than are the children born to mothers ages 20-21.
